

Recommended Reading Lists for each Year group

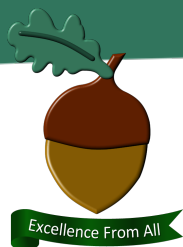

We have put together a list of books that you may wish to read at home with your child. You will see that there is a variety of text types, including poems and non-fiction.

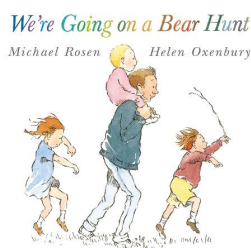
Books for KS1 & EYFS

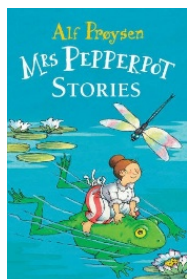
Recommended books for KS2

Recommended reads for Year 5 and 6 are age-appropriate, reading-for-pleasure books. There are fiction and nonfiction books for all ability ranges and interests

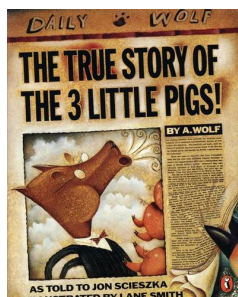
